The YCOA is a volunteer organization of Yukon seniors administered by a Board of Directors elected from its membership.

What We Do

- Promote respect for the contributions of senior citizens and an understanding of the aspirations and issues of concern in their lives.
- Research issues important to seniors and provide a voice that speaks on these issues.
- Liaise with other seniors' groups.
- Offer programs and services that will benefit seniors.

Just after its founding in October, 1978, the YCOA recommended that Government of Yukon assist seniors to stay in their own homes longer by paying an annual utilities grant to be known as the Pioneer Utilities Grant. Since that time, the Council's voice, along with other voices, has resulted in a property tax rebate, city and territorial utilities grants, Pharmacare, eye, hearing and dental care and extended health benefits for seniors.

Currently the Council operates the Seniors Information Centre and the Home and Yard Maintenance Program under contract with Government of Yukon and Yukon Housing Corporation respectively.

The Council offices, rented from the Golden Age Society, are located in the Sport Yukon Building.

Program Overview

The Seniors' Home and Yard Maintenance Program was initiated to help seniors and those with disabilities remain in their homes and "age in place." The program does this by operating a local worker referral service available to all interested senior/elder homeowners and tenants in the Whitehorse area.

Mutual Benefits

For the client, having someone take care of minor tasks can be the difference between living independently at home or having to move. For the worker, earning \$30.00 an hour on a flexible schedule can help to make ends meet.

How it Works

The system is pretty simple. The Program Coordinator takes job requests from clients. He consults his list of workers and calls around to find someone interested in taking the job. Once a match is made, the worker is given a contact number and asked to call the client. At that point, the client will explain the scope of the work to the worker, who has an opportunity to accept or pass on the assignment. Most jobs tend to be fairly short (2 or 3 hours), while others may require return visits over a number of days. Of course, as a sort of independent contractor, the worker can accept or refuse any job based on their own comfort level and interest. In many cases, any equipment required to complete the job will be provided by the client but in some cases the worker will need to supply their own tools.

How to Get Onboard

Call the Program Coordinator, Christopher Wheeler, at (867) 667-4357, or drop by the YCOA offices in the Sports Yukon Building, 4061B 4th Avenue in Whitehorse. Our offices are open from Monday to Friday, 9:00 AM to 1:00 PM. Both potential workers, and clients, need to fill out a **registration form** and sign a **waiver**. Once registered, workers also need to sign a **statement of confidentiality** and provide a current and clear **RCMP Vulnerable Sector Record Check**. That's it!

The Town of Watson Lake has the following Senior programs and rates:

- Town of Watson Lake Seniors Homeowner Grant: (see attached bylaw)
- Eligible seniors (65+) can apply for a tax grant for up to \$600.00/year through the municipality. The eligible amount is calculated after Yukon grants applied. Applications can be made at the Town Office located at 710 Adela Trail, Watson Lake.
- Seniors Household Garbage Collection: Seniors (65+) have a reduced fee for household garbage collection (50% off)
- Seniors Utilities & Water Fees: Seniors (65+) have a reduced fee for utility and water (50% off)
- Assisted Garbage Collection: Seniors or other community members with mobility issues can apply for the Watson Lake Assisted Garbage Collection (Town policy attached). This program allows for municipal garbage collectors to enter onto a property to collect household garbage from those who cannot take their bin to the curbside (specific requirements must be met to qualify). Definition

A non-governmental organization (NGO) is an organization that generally is formed independent from government. They are typically nonprofit entities, and many of them are active in humanitarianism or the social sciences; they can also include clubs and associations that provide services to their members and others. Surveys indicate that NGOs have a high degree of public trust, which can make them a useful proxy for the concerns of society and stakeholders. However, NGOs can also be lobby groups for corporations. NGOs are distinguished from international and intergovernmental organizations (IOs) in that the latter are more directly involved with sovereign states and their governments.¹

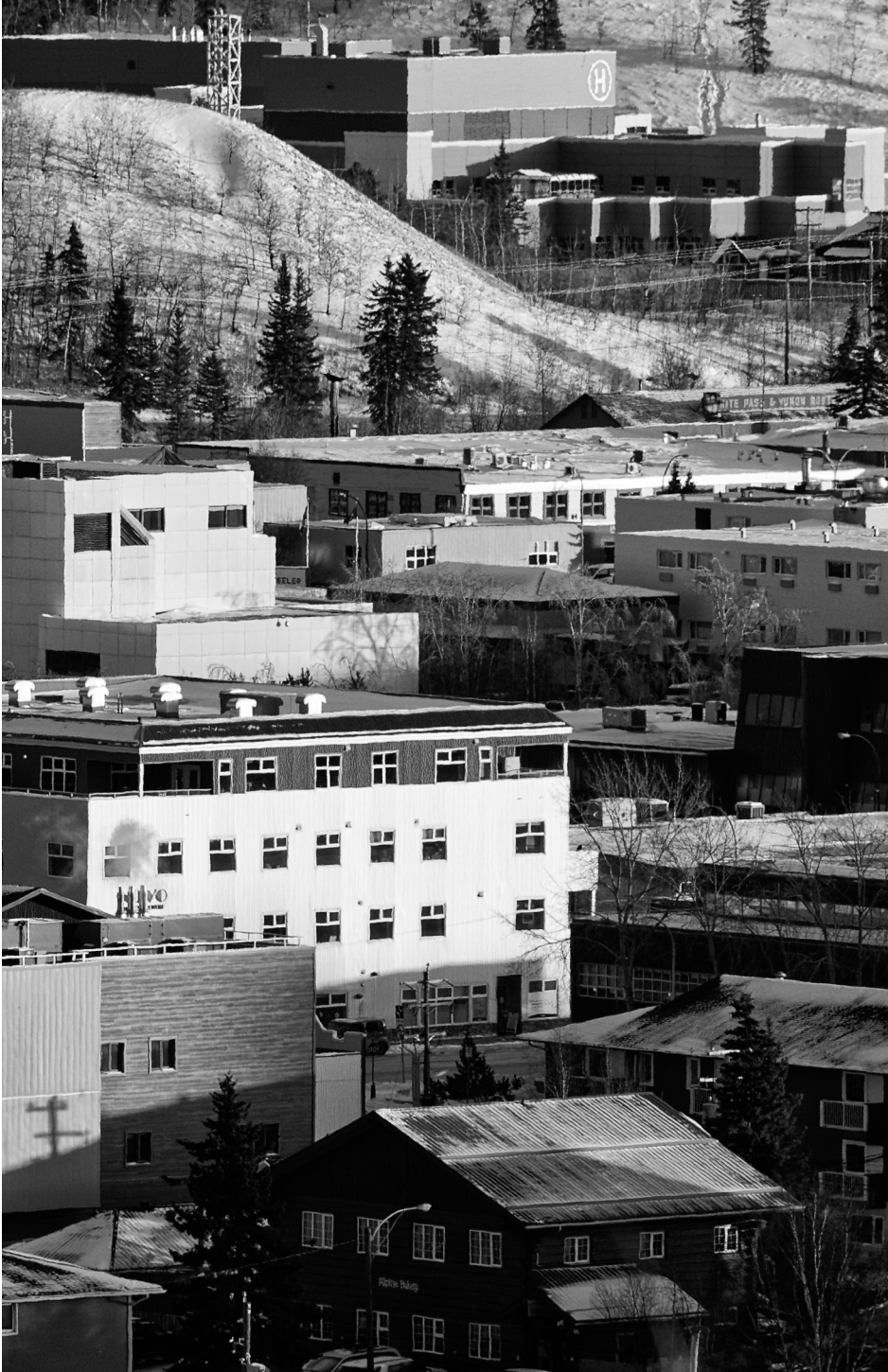

Definition

Post-secondary education in Canada is provided by universities (research universities, undergraduate universities, and university colleges) and vocational institutions (vocational colleges, career colleges, community colleges, institutes of technology or science, colleges of applied arts or applied technology, and in Quebec, collèges d'enseignement général et professionnel). Universities offer bachelor's, master's, professional, and doctoral degrees as well as post-graduate certificates and diplomas while vocational institutions issue diplomas, associate degrees, certificates, and apprenticeships. Vocational institutions offer career-focused training that is often practical where these institutions train their graduates to work as semi-professionals in various fields such as the skilled trades and technical careers and for workers in support roles in professions such as engineering, information technology, accountancy, business administration, health care, architecture, and law. University colleges and vocational institutions also offer degree programs where a student can take courses and receive credit that can be transferred to a university.¹

Yukon University offers educational programs, courses, and services in 14 community campuses located throughout the Yukon, including Ayamdigut campus in Whitehorse. YukonU offers a mix of academic and vocational programming such as career and job readiness, part-time continuing education, and certificate/diploma/degree courses. 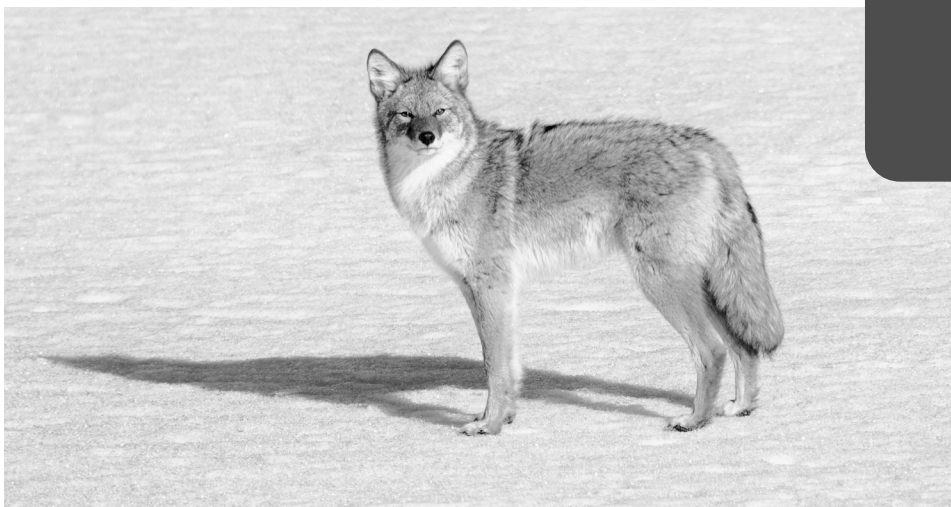

Definition

Yukon (/ˈjuːkɒn/ (listen); French: [jykɔ̃]; formerly called Yukon Territory and also referred to as the Yukon) is the smallest and westernmost of Canada's three territories. It also is the second-least populated province or territory in Canada, with a population of 43,964 as of March 2022. Whitehorse, the territorial capital, is the largest settlement in any of the three territories.

Yukon was split from the North-West Territories in 1898 as the Yukon Territory. The federal government's Yukon Act, which received royal assent on March 27, 2002, established Yukon as the territory's official name, though Yukon Territory is also still popular in usage and Canada Post continues to use the territory's internationally approved postal abbreviation of YT. In 2021, territorial government policy was changed so that “The Yukon” would be recommended for use in official territorial government materials.¹

The Yukon Home Care program delivers health-related services for Yukoners and Lower Post, BC residents, with mobility or health constraints who require care in their homes.

The program provides services for acute care, rehabilitation, chronic and palliative needs, as well as caregiver respite in the home. Services are based on an individual's assessed needs.

Home Care works closely with other departments, First Nations governments, health care providers, and other community organizations.

Available services may include:

- **Nursing services:** assistance with wound care and other medical treatments
- **Social work services:** assistance in identifying client needs and supports
- **Home support services:** assistance with personal care and activities such as bathing, grooming, laundry, grocery shopping, and meal preparation.
- **Rehabilitation services (physiotherapy and occupational therapy):** assessment and provision of home adaptations, prescribed exercise programs, and braces and mobility equipment to increase safety and accessibility.
- **Care coordination services and assistance with referrals to appropriate community supports**
- **Respite care, including Community Day Program**
- **Chronic disease management support, health promotion and preventive healthcare**
- **Palliative care.**

You may self-refer for Home Care services or have someone call on your behalf. Yukon Home Care staff will fill out a referral form with you over the phone. They will then arrange a visit to discuss your referral and assess your needs. For further information, or to start a

Yukon long-term care homes offer:

- **Intermediate Care:** supports adults with moderate functional impairment, and mild to moderate cognitive impairment who: require moderate assistance with their activities of daily living; and benefit from monitoring and/or direct care provision intermittently on a 24-hour basis.
- **Extended Care:** supports individuals who require extensive assistance with their activities of daily living, 24-hour monitoring and/or professional care, but do not require the resources of an acute care hospital.
- **Dementia Care:** supports mobile adults who have dementia and require a therapeutic and secure environment. They require 24-hour monitoring and support; are independently mobile and require a secure environment; and may require or benefit from therapeutic services or programs.
- **Hospice Care:** supports end of life care where the focus is on the care, comfort, and quality of life of a person with a serious illness who is approaching the end of life. Please see the “Wind River Hospice House” section.
- **Respite Care:** for those who can live outside of a long-term care home with a caregiver, but where their caregiver needs scheduled breaks. Please see the “Respite Care” section.
- **Reablement Care:** helps individuals adjust back to life in their community after a hospital stay or prolonged injury or illness and, helps them remain independent for as long as possible. Please see the “Reablement Program” section.

The Reablement program, located in Thomson Centre in Whitehorse, supports a home-first philosophy, where individuals receive the health care support they need in order to remain in, or return to their home in the community. It helps individuals to return to a place where they can function on their own after a period of illness or other health crisis.

Individuals may be admitted to the reablement program:

- After discharge from hospital, with the goal of returning home to live independently; or
- Directly from their home, with the goal of increasing their function and strength, to avoid premature admission to long-term care.

Reablement is suitable for individuals who:

- Do not require acute care but are not yet sufficiently independent to manage at home with available community supports.
- Require time to recover their strength, endurance or functioning.
- Are motivated to continue undertaking activities of daily living.
- Need a period of time in which to recover independence (strength, endurance or functioning); and
- Are likely to benefit from a short stay in a non-acute setting before returning home.

The Reablement unit offers 10 single-bed rooms with private bathrooms, supervised access to the gym, a communal dining area with self-serving beverage area and a meeting room. The average length of stay is 90 days.

Respite is an important part of the care that supports individuals to remain in their homes for as long as possible. Respite programs support a home-first philosophy by providing a short stay in one of Yukon's long-term care homes or respite care in a person's home. Respite care provides caregivers, including those who are their own caregiver, with scheduled breaks.

Respite in a long-term care home is available to individuals whose needs are met by one of the respite program's objectives, which are:

- Scheduled support for caregiver respite.
- Urgent/unplanned respite for unforeseen caregiver needs, such as a hospital admission.
- Prevent or minimize the risk of caregiver burnout.
- To support caregivers who will be away for a defined and specific amount of time, such as a holiday.
- Transitional support from acute care to a community setting.
- May be used for assessment purposes, to determine if they meet criteria for permanent long-term care placement, as a last resort when other options, such as assessment in the home environment, are not available.

Types of respite care:

- **Respite in a private home**
 - This provides respite for unpaid caregivers who need relief from caregiving responsibilities for an individual who cannot be left alone; and
 - A Home Care staff member will assist the client with socialization, activation, recreation and personal care.
- **Respite in a long-term care home**
 - Respite rooms are available in all four long-term care homes and meet a variety of needs including intermediate care, extended care, dementia care and palliative/hospice care. Respite care in each long-term care home is available 24/7.

Respite Care (H&SS) continued . . .

- Continuing Care schedules long-term care respite stays in advance. Requests for urgent or unplanned respite admissions and requests to extend an existing respite stay can only be accommodated when a respite room is available.
- **Community Day Program**
 - The program supports clients to continue living in their homes, provides respite to caregivers, and delivers programming that fosters independence and quality of life.
 - The Community Day Program is suitable for adults with cognitive and/or physical impairments who meet the program's eligibility criteria.
 - Participants of the Community Day Program benefit from daily recreational activities, therapeutic programs, socialization, activities of daily living including bathing services, and maintaining their independence.
 - The program operates daily from 8:30 am to 4:30 pm, Monday to Friday, out of Whistle Bend Place in Whitehorse. Participants may select their level of involvement, ranging from part-time to full-time. There is a program fee of \$5 per day.

Continuing Care provides dedicated hospice care at Wind River Hospice House in Whistle Bend Place. End-of-life care is provided in a home-like setting, 24-hours a day. Wind River Hospice House provides care for:

- Adults with a life-limiting illness in its advanced stages.
- Adults with a prognosis of 3 months or less;
 - Adults with a prognosis of longer than 3 months will be considered on a case-by-case basis.
- Adults with a life-limiting illness and a prognosis of less than 12 months who require a brief respite care stay. The average length of a respite stay is 2–4 weeks. Respite care gives a person's regular caregivers a break from providing that care.

The Yukon Human Rights Commission (the Commission) was created in 1987 to promote human rights through research, education, and enforcement of the Yukon Human Rights Act (the Act). The Commission is independent from all levels of government. Its process is governed by the Act and the Yukon Human Rights Regulation (the Regulation).

What We Do:

Research: The Commission has a mandate to conduct research and share information about equality, harassment, discrimination, and human rights.

Education: The Commission provides helpful, accessible resources and materials for the general public. It hosts conferences and events to inform and raise awareness of human rights issues. The Commission also offers training on human rights on request.

Enforcement: The Commission operates a complaint resolution process as set out in the Act. The Commission is mandated with resolving human rights complaints, or referring human rights complaints to the Yukon Human Rights Panel of Adjudicators where a settlement is not realized by the parties. The Commission's complaint resolution processes are established by the Act and the Regulation. As this process is complaint driven, the Commission cannot conduct investigations of its own motion.

The Access to Information and Protection of Privacy Act (ATIPPA) and the Health Information Privacy and Management Act (HIPMA) are the two laws in Yukon that provide access to information rights and protection of privacy rights to Yukoners. These laws establish rules that public bodies including the Yukon Government and health sector custodians (include medical clinics and Yukon hospitals) must follow to collect, use, disclose, secure and manage personal and health information. Under ATIPPA the public has the right to access any records held by public bodies. Under HIPMA individuals have the right to access their own personal health information.

The Office of the Information and Privacy Commissioner (OIPC) is responsible to ensure public bodies and health sector custodians comply with these laws. The IPC has the power to investigate complaints about non-compliance and other responsibilities including to inform the public about these laws.
